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## **Methodology Statement**

Bowling Green State University/YouGov Survey of Ohio Likely Voters

Survey Research Field Dates: October 10th – 21st, 2024

N = 1000 Ohio Likely Voters Margin of Error: +/- 3.6%

N = 500 Ohio Likely Voters Margin of Error +/- 5.14% **for Test Questions 9 and 10 only**

YouGov interviewed 1170 Ohio registered voters, with the goal of screening for and surveying likely voters. These Ohio registered voters were then matched down to a sample of 1011, yielding a target subsample of 1000 Ohio likely voters. The respondents were matched to a sampling frame on gender, age, race, and education. The sampling frame is a politically representative "modeled frame" of US adults, based upon the American Community Survey (ACS) public use microdata file, public voter file records, the 2020 Current Population Survey (CPS) Voting and Registration supplements, the 2020 National Election Pool (NEP) exit poll, and the 2020 CES surveys, including demographics and 2020 presidential vote. The matched cases were weighted to the sampling frame using propensity scores. The matched cases and the frame were combined and a logistic regression was estimated for inclusion in the frame. The propensity score function included age, gender, race/ethnicity, years of education, and region. The propensity scores were grouped into deciles of the estimated propensity score in the frame and post-stratified according to these deciles. The weights were then post-stratified on 2020 presidential vote choice as well as a four-way stratification of gender, age (4-categories), race (4-categories), and education (4-categories). The weighted dataset of Ohio registered voters was then subsetted on likely voters, as determined by response to the question, "Thinking ahead to the presidential election in November, how likely are you to vote?" Upon subsetting to those who answered at least "somewhat likely," the weights were trimmed and recentered around 1, to produce the final weights for Ohio likely voters

This November, Ohio voters will be asked to approve or reject Issue 1, a ballot measure addressing redistricting. How much have you heard or read about Issue 1 in Ohio?

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## 9. Shown to one half of respondents:

This November, voters will be asked whether they approve or reject Issue 1.

Issue 1 is an amendment to the Ohio Constitution to change the redistricting process in the state. A ‘Yes’ vote would establish a new bipartisan redistricting commission composed of 15 members equally divided between Democrats, Republicans, and Independents. All members and family members of the Commission will not have held a local, state, or federal elected position for the previous six years. Commissioners cannot have been registered as a lobbyist in Ohio or the federal government for the preceding six years as well. The amendment seeks to ban partisan gerrymandering that favors one political party and disfavors others.

If the election were held today, would you vote ‘Yes’ in favor of Issue 1 or ‘No’ to reject Issue 1 — the Citizens Redistricting Commission Initiative.

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## 10. Shown to one half of respondents:

This November, voters will be asked whether they approve or reject Issue 1.

Currently, the Ohio Redistricting Commission is responsible for drawing legislative maps in the state of Ohio. The Ohio Redistricting Commission is comprised of seven members:

1. The Governor
2. The Auditor
3. The Secretary of State
4. One individual appointed by the Senate President
5. One individual appointed by the Speaker of the House
6. One individual appointed by the Senate Minority Leader
7. One individual appointed by the House Minority Leader

Between September 2021 and November 2023, the Ohio Supreme Court rejected four different maps created by the Ohio Redistricting Commission. The Court ruled that they violated the Ohio Constitution's requirements related to redistricting. In each case, the Commission was ordered to draw new maps that were consistent with those requirements.
